# Talking Food Security

Through June and July this year, Landcare Illawarra hosted a two part series of Talking Landcare events.

Landcare Illawarra

> Talking Landcare events invite a range of speakers from the community to discuss a variety of topics covering not only Landcare issues in the Illawarra, but a range of sustainability and environmental-themed topics. Guest speakers are invited to share their knowledge and expertise covering a diversity of projects occurring in our region.

> Part I of our two part series set the scene with the screening of US documentary "The Greenhorns". The Greenhorns documentary film, completed after almost 3 years in production, explores the lives of America's young farming community – its spirit, practices, and needs. The documentary is an inspiring example of community taking the initiative to develop strategies for securing food supplies for local people.

Our guest speaker, Vanessa John, Environmental Strategy Officer for Wollongong City Council gave an overview of what local initiatives were taking place in the Illawarra over the three council areas Wollongong, Shellharbour and Kiama and how the community can become involved. Vanessa spoke about what was happening in local schools, community gardens, and food coops.

Part II of our series was held in Kiama and we heard from community groups who are actively delivering projects which address local food security and are providing opportunities for the wider community to either become educated or involved in local food production, or access produce from local growers.

Students from Kiama Public School who have been working with local Permaculture Gurus Aaron Sorenson



and Dan Deighton to develop a sustainable food garden, gave a presentation about how the garden is producing healthy food as well as bush tucker foods for the students to eat.

Barb Kahlifa gave a presentation about how the GreenBox Food cooperative in Gerringong works and how it is providing a connection between local farmers and producers to consumers in the region.

Members of the Kiama Community Garden spoke about the establishment of the garden, how the volunteers are working together to produce locally grown food, educational experiences available to home gardeners through workshops, and the development of a native food forest on the hillside adjacent to the community garden.

Tim Jackson and Jessica Taylor also gave an overview of an exciting initiative they are involved in called South Coast Food which aims to offer connection, education and marketing opportunities for all food related businesses in the South Coast region of NSW.

Food available on the evening was provided by the wonderful volunteers of Landcare Illawarra, Mullet Creek Community Garden Landcare and Kiama Community Garden.

# MEET THE VOLUNTEERS

### Volunteer ProFile

Landcare Illawarra



Our volunteers are the driving force of Landcare and often go unrecognised in the community for their hard work. They work tirelessly and contribute many hours to their local patch of native bushland. So we want to introduce them to you, and hear more about what makes them tick...

#### Meet: Adrian Begg

**Group:** Landcare Illawarra Chair, South East Landcare Chair, member of Bombo Headland Landcare

How long have you been volunteering for?: I became a Landcare volunteer seven years ago when I was living in northern New South Wales. I had just retired, and was looking for something to do that would make a positive contribution to the environment. I checked out a few organistions but most of them were too militant for my tastes. I don't believe you have to chain yourself to a bulldozer to be a good environmentalist. I went to a few political meetings with The Greens but came away very disillusioned.

#### What inspired you to get involved?:

For me, the attraction of Landcare is that it is nonpolitical. The focus of volunteer work is on planting or site maintenance - generally getting your hands dirty for a few hours at weekends. I find Landcare satisfying because after a few hours' work you can see the results of your efforts - trees planted, or lantana cleared, and you can go home knowing that you have done something useful. I'll leave the bulldozer protests to others!

I also found that Landcarers were a particularly nice

group of people and our working bees tended to be pleasant social gatherings. Working sessions usually end with coffee and cake and a chat.

I spent a couple of years working with the Brunswick Heads Dunecare group. Years ago the dunes in the area were the site of sand mining operations and when the miners moved out their idea of rehabilitation was to plant Bitou bush. It was a plant that stabilised the dunes but it also happens to be rated as the worst pest plant in the Australian coastal environment, restricting access to beaches and destroying native bushland. Thanks to the miners, it has taken over vast areas of our coast. I spent many enjoyable weekends with a machete working out my aggression on those Bitou bushes!

I joined Brunswick Valley Landcare, which is the district Landcare body for the area and was persuaded to join the committee, becoming the Chair for a couple of years.

When I returned to the Illawarra in 2009 I was happy to continue my association with Landcare through Landcare Illawarra, as an occasional volunteer with the keen Landcarers at Bombo Headland, and also this year as Chair of South-East Landcare, which is the regional association of district Landcare bodies.

# My First Year at WIRES

I have been an animal lover all my life, and two years ago I joined WIRES Illawarra Branch and it is the best thing I have ever done, and this is why:

Six months after I joined, and had completed both the Possum and Macropod courses I got a phone call from the Macropod Coordinator. I have two joeys that need 'babysitting' over Christmas for three weeks and wondered if you would like to do this, have a think about it? My answer was immediate – 'I don't need to think about it at all, when can I pick them up?

I brought them home on a Sunday afternoon, I was absolutely terrified! There they were these two absolutely beautiful Eastern Grey Kangaroos hanging in their pouches looking at me, so I sat on the floor with them for about an hour just talking to them and getting them used to my voice, it was a really lovely time. They are very inquisitive animals, and they do get to know you very quickly. Thelma and Louise stayed with me for about 3 months, they left my care when they were emerging from their pouch and therefore ready for the next stage in their development, which was to move into the pre-release area (whilst still being cared for), they were big, beautiful healthy Kangaroos. I cannot even begin to tell you how proud of them I was, and the satisfaction I felt at giving them a helping hand along the way. Yes it is sad to say goodbye, but they are not babies anymore, they are majestic Australian icons, on their way back to where they belong with nature and I helped them get there, wow!

I have since then cared for 7 eastern grey Kangaroo joeys, three ringtail possums, one brushtail possum and two galahs. I cannot imagine my backyard without a native animal wandering around!!

Joining WIRES has been the best thing I have ever done, not only do I get to wake up to our beautiful Australian wildlife in my own backyard every day, I have made friendships that I know will last my lifetime, people who are likeminded and are as 'crazy' about animals as I am. We have our get togethers and we have a bond that will never be broken. We all work very hard for our common cause – to rescue, rehabilitate and release as many of our beautiful Australian native animals as possible.

# WEED-WATCH

# Red WitchWeed

Illawarra District Noxious Weeds Authority

Keep your eyes open for a serious class 1 weed that was recently discovered growing in Queensland.

Red Witchweed (*Striga asiatica*) was recently found growing in a sugarcane crop at Mackay. While it has only been found in Queensland and this is the first outbreak in Australia, it could easily grow in our region and wreak havoc.

It is not known how Red Witchweed, a native to parts of Africa, the Middle East and Asia, got into the country. Each year it causes an estimated \$7 billion in damage due to lost productivity to grain crops in Africa.

Red Witchweed is a parasitic plant that grows attached to the roots of a 'host' plant. The weed then robs its host of water and nutrients, suppressing its growth. A host includes a range of grasses, such as pastures, wheat, sorghum, rice, barley, corn (maize) and sugarcane.

If you suspect you have seen Red Witchweed please report it immediately via www.looklearnact.com, or by calling (02) 6623 3866 or your local Council.

Please do not attempt to remove any flowering plants as this may allow the weed to spread via tiny, dustlike seeds. Seeds are primarily spread within soil, and plants have a complex underground root system once established. Keep the weed in place until weed officers can investigate.

You should mark or clearly note the location of the weed, and where possible take photos that may be used to help with identification. If Red Witchweed is suspected, soil, machinery or products that may contain soil should not be moved off-site.

#### Identification of Red Witchweed

- Grows to 20-40cm tall
- Attaches to the roots of its host
- Leaves arranged in opposite pairs along the stem
- Leaves 6-40mm long and 1-4mm wide with tapered, pointed tips
- Flowers 5-20mm long
- Flowers usually red, but sometimes white, yellow or pink
- Five-sided capsule fruit 4mm long and 2mm wide
- Seeds very small and remain viable in the soil for up to 15 years

# Heagache Aive

#### **Botanical name:** Clematis glycinoides

Meaning of the Name: Clematis Greek - Klematis means a twig, the plant has twiggy branches

Glycinoides - means like Glycine (genus name for soybean) Habit: A climber

Leaves: Compound leaflets.

Flowers: White and conspicuous.

Flowering time - August - October.

Fruit: Fluffy like clustered.

Habitat: Sheltered areas as well as forests.

**Distribution:** Common and widespread from the coast to the Mountains, forest, open woodland.

Medicinal Use: The leaves of this plant were crushed then inhaled to relieve the symptoms of headache, sinus, colds and nasal congestion.


# **ILLAWARRA WOODLAND** & RAINFOREST PROJECT

## Project Update

Landcare Illawarra is now into the third stage of *Protecting Illawarra Endangered Ecological Communities (EECs)* – *Illawarra Woodland and Rainforest Project* which is being funded by the Australian government's Clean Energy Future Biodiversity Fund Program.

Our project commenced in September 2012, and we have been working with 5 landholders, Conservation Volunteers Australia, and local nurseries, to improve the condition of Woodland and Rainforest vegetation in the Illawarra.

The Woodland and Rainforest project has also assisted with other regional programs such as the Southern Rivers Catchment Management Authorities' Escarpment to Sea program which aimed to assist



landholders to link corridors of remnant vegetation in the Illawarra.

With our ongoing seed collections and partnerships with local nurseries who propagate our seed for us, we have been able to plant over 6 200 native plants back into our local Landcare projects and on private property. This includes 92 different species which have been locally collected and propagated.

In the next 12 months...

Landcare Illawarra will continue to work with new and existing landholders we have worked with under this program in the region, and will continue to support quality on-ground works.

> We will be carrying out community seed collection expeditions in a variety of locations where anyone from the local community can come and assist and learn a little bit more about the project and our native vegetation.

As a key partner in the delivery of this program, Conservation Volunteers Australia transports teams of volunteers to private properties involved in the program. Here volunteers assist landholders under the supervision of a team leader and the Landcare Illawarra Project Officer, to carry out invasive species management, tree planting activities and any other activities appropriate to the site.

Volunteers are able to visit some spectacular vegetation only accessible on private property and will be contributing to

valuable biodiversity outcomes for the Illawarra.
